English

The children will learn about:

- Persuasion visit Blackpool: TV broadcasts/formal presentations
- Legends of the British Isles –Outlaw (Robin Hood)
- Myths and Legends linked to Robin Hood
- Daily guided reading
- Using modal verbs and adverbs to indicate degrees of possibility
- Creating complex sentences

Physical Education

The children will take part in: Invasion Games Netball Dance- Lancashire Giant

Science, Geography, History, Art, D&T and Computing

In Science, the children will learn about properties and changes of materials, reversible changes including mixing and separating and insoluble and soluble materials. They will explore reversible changes including evaporating, filtering, sieving, melting and dissolving, recognising that melting and dissolving are different processes.

In History, the children will learn about the History of Poulton.

In DT, the children will be learning about the Lancashire Cotton Industry and how materials are woven together.

In ICT, we will focus on coding. The children will start to develop independence in a visual programming language, writing their own code rather than just following instructions and testing out ideas.

Mathematics

The children will learn:

Place value – reading and writing numbers up to 1 million

- Weekly arithmetic
- Place value decimals
- Written addition and subtraction
- Geometry (angles)
- Geometry and measures (perimeter)
- Addition and subtraction (statistics)
